It was a sunny Friday morning, Ratoath locals had begun their morning rituals, some grabbing their favourite beverage from Café Novello. It didn't last long; the next 3 days consisted of complete closure of Café Novello, lost revenue, and staff left without pay- is this what a modern business should be facing in Ratoath in 2023?

News & Views had the opportunity to catch up with local resident and restaurant business owner, Russell Bailey, we got to talking about the water situation and how it impacts not only residents but local businesses too. La Bucca restaurant, Friday - they had water in the tanks, but once that emptied they had to turn to 'Take away' only.

20 staff work in the restaurant on a normal shift, 8 of whom are in the kitchen. During water outage they keep only 6 kitchen staff on, the rest are sent home. The social media updates advise of 'Take away' only and fingers crossed customers will see it and order.

The first day wasn't too bad in terms of mood amongst staff, but when it continues into day 2 and then 3 they begin to realise this impacts their total working hours and wages. Russell employs over 90 staff, all permanent. Many rely on their wages to pay for college, others to pay mortgages & bills.

Thankfully the water outage didn't impact La Bucca in Dunboyne but it did impact Ashbourne to an extent. The local Ashbourne fire brigade helped refill their water tank.

On Friday and Saturday Russell spent most of his time driving up and down to the water collection points to carry 20l water buckets, putting them in

the back of his car and then carrying them upstairs to the restaurant. This water was used to flush the toilets and by the kitchen porters. This is time that he should be in the restaurant, managing and not driving around the village trying to get water. In this industry any sort of disruption to the running of a business drives the business closer to the edge. It is mentally draining but Russell has 90 people depending on him so there is no space for giving up.

La Bucca opened in 2007 in Ratoath, the population of the village started to boom and that is when there should have been plans made regarding the water supply. Since then local businesses have been through a tough recession, life changing pandemic and more recently a utility crisis. Sadly the one thing that has always been present is the Ratoath water crisis. 16 years later the problem is still here.

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Russell has attended numerous public meetings with politicians and councillors, most recent was before the pandemic. At that point everyone was very angry (water outage for 2 weeks) and there were many promises made back then, only now there is something being done. It is hard to believe that it takes so many years to start solving the water situation in Ratoath.

Living in Ratoath since 2001, Russell has mixed emotions on how he feels, he was definitely angry before, at this point you could nearly call it depressed, it is hard and frustrating both as a resident and a business owner. The first thing he does in the morning is check the water tap at home to determine whether there will be water in the restaurant. "It is ridiculous to think that at this day and age this is what we are facing!" he added.

Over 20 years ago when the village was building up, it was then the necessary infrastructure should have been planned. Russell's thoughts on Irish Water, he feels they are the current scapegoat, they inherited this situation. They do however; need to have better communication, as at a highly stressful time, it is near impossible to get through to them by phone.

He strongly believes until there is a proper water supply in place there should be no further developments built. Water has to be priority over all else. Local councillors will always take Russell's call, they will always give the information that they have, not necessarily always able to help but definitely they will hear him out and for this he is grateful.

When asked what keeps him going, Russell with conviction replied, "I'm doing this 20 years, it is not in me to give in, giving up is not an option & too many people rely on me."

Let's hope we are once and for all going to get this resolved for all both living and working in our community. Since meeting Russell we were hit again with a further water outage due to a burst pipe.

THINKING GLOBALLY ... ACTING LOCALLY RATOATH COLLEGE: "LEAD THE SCENE &

KEEP IT GREEN"

The ECO-UNESCO Young Environmentalists Awards competition is an all-Ireland programme that recognizes the work of young people who act and raise awareness about important environmental issues. Students in Ratoath College who were involved in the project have been recognized for their commitment and contribution to raising awareness about the importance of acting sustainably, with the judges very impressed with the creativity at the heart of this environmental project. The product received the overall award for the 'Most Sustainable School' in Ireland on Friday 26th May in the Convention Centre in Dublin. The inspiring Ratoath College project has been produced and encouraged under the mentorship of their Sustainability Leadership Team coordinator Ms Ursula Hynes.



No Job Too Big or Too Small

Student Saoirse Browne explains: "Sustainable Development Goal 3, regarding 'Good Health and Well-being' is one of the 17 sustainable development goals, established by the United Nations in 2015. The official wording is 'To ensure healthy lives and promote well-being for all, at all ages'. Here in Ratoath College, we like to 'Think Globally, but Act Locally' and this slogan is an integral part of everything we do in our school. Over the next fifteen years, we as students will not only directly experience the outcome of SDGs and plans but will also be the key driver for their successful implementation. For this reason, it is vital that we build a platform for discussion and create the conditions for active engagement".

Passionate about protecting our environment, Kate Hayes (6th year Ratoath College) adds: "We believe that by acting sustainably in our school and keeping it litter free, this has a hugely positive effect on our overall health and wellbeing. So instead of waiting for grand breakthroughs to 'fix the world', we try to implement environmentally conscious and healthy solutions into everyday decisions and actions. We are challenging other schools, to do what we did, and look for ways their school promotes sustainability, healthy lives and wellbeing for their students. We created a video linking the SDGs to everyday life in our school and challenged other schools to promote their sustainability initiatives in their own schools. We really hope our video inspires others to take action now".

However, as Ms Hynes explains, their sustainability success didn't happen overnight with their 'Lead the Scene and Keep it Green' campaign starting in January 2022. She explains "This project is a culmination of dedication, perseverance and hard work from our Sustainability Leadership Team over the last 18 months. We could see the world around us changing and beginning to take note of the plastic use and we wanted to be ambassadors for change in



our community. We knew we would all have to our individual understand and collective responsibilities in order to take real action in our school and bring about meaningful change. It started with a desire to reduce the use of single-use plastics in our school. Our project started with monitoring litter within our school community and creating awareness about the damage single-use plastics can do to our environment. Our extensive research and monitoring showed us that students using single-use water bottles and teachers using single-use coffee cups were found to be the largest obstacles in relation to reducing litter and waste in our school".

In September 2022, the school supplied every student with their own RC Reusable Water Bottle and every staff member with a RC Reusable Coffee mug free of charge. The campaign has led to a complete ban on single-use plastic bottles and coffee cups in the school, saving an average of over 15,000 bottles so far from landfill.



They also promote all our 'Keep it Green' initiatives on all our Social Media pages and we hope our campaign has helped the wider community to realise the need to reduce their use of single-use plastics for a sustainable future.

The Green Schools leadership team are aware of the importance of looking more closely at striving for a 'circular economy' and how 'fast fashion' and the production of cheap, poor-quality clothing results in overwhelming amounts of consumption and waste.

The team also coordinated a very successful 'Sustainability Action Day' in December, when they hosted their first ever 'clothes swop' event. Highlighting the important transition in awareness and attitude from a 'take, wear, dispose' approach to clothing (linear economy) to a 'care, share, repair' approach (circular economy), while shifting mindsets away from ownership and explore ideas like renting and leasing options, second hand or charity shops, as well as clothes swapping.

The team also celebrated a wonderfully exciting 'May Day for Sustainability, as part of their commitment to the Take 1 Programme. Celebrating their new garden and participating in the 'Metre of Meadow' campaign, they organized their first 'Scruffy's Electric Picnic' music festival, taking enjoyment of the outdoors to a whole new level. The Take 1 Programme promotes an Education for Sustainable Development (ESD) awareness raising campaign in schools, which includes support to engage with the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals in a formal way through classroom experiences.

As a school, Ratoath College are now looking at the process of embedding SDGs engagement through subject syllabuses. Highlighting with staff and students, how every student in every class, through every subject, can experience the interdependent nature and impact of education in sustainable development.

BLOOMING FLOWERS AT JAMESTOWN SPORTS CAMPUS

_ . _ . _ Last year Ratoath Tidy Towns in collaboration with the Ratoath Community Centre worked together to enhance the Jamestown Campus Car Park. The car park was an area of poor grass and rubble. Together the two groups worked to improve this area. We started by hiring a digger and a rotavator to dig the soil and remove any large stones. We planted a hawthorn hedge to the rear of the site on the area that adjoins The Old Mill. We cut back some briars and some dead debris. Through the 'Orchards in the Community' Project under the Host in Ireland 'DCs for Bees' initiative, we got access to 40 trees. The ten local mini-orchards, each comprising of three varied apple-trees, one plum-tree and one pear



tree, have been planted at the Ratoath Community Sports Campus. We know orchards play a key role in protecting bees. Most of these trees are planted at the edge of the Athletics track, 18 trees are planted at the

Ratoath Tidy Towns sourced pollinator friendly plants Aubrieta, Broom, Salvia Caradonia, Verbena, Digitalis.

We carefully selected plants that will flower at different times of the year and thus provide a source of food over a long period of time, we selected perennial species. We also planted a wildflower bed with native wildflower seeds in between the trees and the fresh grass.

Tidy Towns collaborated with other groups; we contacted the local Scouts group, they provided us with 3 miniature bug hotels. We contacted the Local Men's Shed, they provided and installed 6 handmade bird boxes and 2 information signs. We are very grateful of the assistance of John and Seán, two CE participants who have assisted us with this project in its development and continued maintenance. A year later we are thrilled with the results. Please go visit the area and have a look.




ON THE ROAD AGAIN SEPTEMBER 16TH

Ones to watch:


